**Course Content Summary:** Art 205 emphasizes aesthetics, content, technical aspects, ways of seeing, and creativity in photography. This is an introductory photography course that explores camera operation, color and grayscale optimization, digital capture, and Camera RAW. Appropriate for students without prior photographic experience. Requires a digital camera with adjustable shutter speeds, adjustable apertures, manual exposure mode, and Camera RAW file format. # 205 Course Objectives & Student Learning Outcomes (curricunet) Following completion of this course with a grade of "C" or higher, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to communicate and describe one's own creative expression by stating personal intent, choice of subject matter, symbolic meaning, and personal vision including photographic composition, use of light, and formal description.
- 2. Demonstrate the application of proper camera handling, image exposure, and image optimization for making photographic prints of optimum technical quality and craft according to professional standards.

# 205 Course Objectives & Student Learning Outcomes By the end of this course, a student should be able to:

- 1. Communicate and describe one's own creative expression and conceptual considerations by stating personal intent, choice of subject matter, and significance or meaning from the subject matter.
- 2. Communicate and describe one's own creative expression with formal considerations including composition, use of light, use of tone and contrast, and considerations for creating a visual emphasis.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to analyze, evaluate, and describe photographs using terms of formal elements and composition, and name specific techniques used in the image-making process.
- 4. Apply criticism to one's own artwork by determining the successful parts of a project, and determining the areas that can be improved.
- 5. Analyze photographic images according to theory associated with John Szarkowski's The Photographer's Eve.
- 6. Demonstrate and understand composition and design concepts for creating visual emphasis.
- 7. Demonstrate the application of proper camera handling, including the ability to set ISO, aperture, and shutter-speed to produce a specific desired effect.
- 8. Demonstrate the relationship between Depth-Of-Field, and aperture, focal length, and distance between recording plane and subject.
- 9. Demonstrate the relationship between Shutter-speeds and their effect on both motion-blur and stop-action imagery.
- 10. Demonstrate an understanding of tonal values, their relationship to the histogram, their relationship to exposure, their relationship to contrast, and their relationship to shadow and highlight details.
- 11. Demonstrate the proper use of white-balance during shooting and in Camera RAW editing software.
- 12. Demonstrate basic color correction in Camera RAW.
- 13. Demonstrate digital capture, image exposure, digital image optimization, and ink-jet printing for making photographic prints of optimum technical quality and craft according to professional standards.
- 14. Demonstrate the ability to make a print presentation-ready by mounting.

**Final Grade Scale:** 100-90 = A, 89-80 = B, 79-70 = C, 69-60 = D, 59-0 = F

**Grading:** Scores are awarded based on the ability to meet project criteria. This includes the utilization of specific skills, consideration to craftsmanship, and completeness of project. Critique participation is required. All projects must be turned in on-time. Late assignments / exercises will not be accepted.

Grades will be posted to the SWC Blackboard system.

Grading Criteria: (these are examples of what you need to do to get the grade you want from this class)

- A: Student attended class regularly. Student completed all assignments on time. Student went beyond expectations for each assignment. Student completed extra credit work. Student was involved in classroom activities and discussions and proved themselves to be a positive force in the classroom dynamic.
- B: Student attended class regularly. Student completed most assignments on time. Student completed each assignment. Student was involved in classroom activities and discussions.
- C: Student did not attend class regularly. Student was late completing assignments. Student did not meet all of the goals of a few of the assignments. Student was involved in some of the classroom activities and discussions.
- D: Student did not attend class regularly. Student was late completing assignments. Student did not complete the goals of most of the assignments. Student did not participate in classroom acitivities or discussions.
- F: Student did not attend class regularly. Student failed to turn assignments in on time or at all. Student did not complete the goals of most or all of the assignments. Student did not participate in classroom acitivities or discussions.

**Participation:** You will start with 10 points (%) and if you fail to attend class regularly, are consistently late to class or returning from breaks, engage in the inappropriate use of internet and cell phones, and or do not participate in class activities such as critique and in-class work, your points in this area will decrease. The instructor will keep a record of students' participation activity.

**Printing:** It is highly recommended that you use the printing facilities in the SWC Photo Department. Each 8.5" x 11" print is \$1. The quality is professional and inexpensive.

**Mounting materials:** can be purchased at the SWC Bookstore. The price will vary on the size. Please DO NOT purchase Mounting Materials until we discuss this in class.

Plan on producing 15 prints in this class.

## **Print Storage:**

You will need to need to invest in a method of protecting your prints. Either a plastic sleeve or folder. Three-ringed binder - is useful for keeping notes from the class and prints in one place.
